Dear Colleagues:

The Academic Senate’s Jane Teranes Climate Change Education Requirement (JTCCER) Committee invites Departments to submit proposals to create a list of courses approved to satisfy the JTCCE Requirement. As established in Senate Regulation 600.H, “A knowledge of climate change is required of all candidates for a Bachelor’s degree who begin their studies at UC San Diego in lower-division standing in Fall 2024 or thereafter.” With the goal of having a solid roster of courses satisfying this new requirement for incoming students<sup>1</sup>, we ask for your rapid response to this request, with two deadlines for consideration on April 15 and May 20, 2024.

*\* Please note that proposals may require further clarification after the initial review. Proposers are encouraged to submit their proposals for the April 15 deadline.*

## **CRITERIA**

Courses approved to satisfy the JTCCE Requirement must address the following: 30% of the course content should be focused on understanding and addressing climate change and its impacts.

- 30% corresponds to 3 weeks of a 4-unit course that should be dedicated to climate change in the form of lectures, reading, project-based learning activities, and/or case studies. Assignments and grades must also reference climate change content with at least 20% of the grade determined by it.

## **Curriculum Content Integration**

In preparing a proposal for JTCCER status, it is essential to discuss how the proposed course is aligned with the mission and goals of the JTCCE Requirement. The course should have substantial contributions from least two of the four following categories:

1. Scientific Underpinnings  
How does the course provide students with a scientific foundation to understand the mechanisms responsible for climate change and the scope of projected climate change, including knowledge of the magnitude of the impact of human-caused climate change on the planet, the biosphere, or society?
2. Humanistic and Social Dimensions  
How does the course provide knowledge of the historical, cultural, or social causes of climate change? How does the course provide an understanding of the human costs, consequences, and disproportionate impacts of climate change or its basis in human

values? Does the course offer context for understanding how addressing the climate crisis requires social, political, or economic transitions and transformations? Does the course engage health, equity, and climate justice issues?

3. Climate Solutions

How does the course provide knowledge of both scientific and non- technical solutions to the crisis? Does the course consider social, cultural, or political adaptations to climate change? Do the solutions discussed include a holistic assessment of political, social, economic, behavioral, or technological approaches? Does the course consider the needs and/or concerns of those experiencing the impact of climate change? Does it put solutions in the context of the scientific underpinnings and/or humanistic or social dimensions of climate change?

4. Project-based Learning about a Climate Change Topic

How do students have opportunities to gain experience or work on a project that is related to climate change content? For example, a project-based writing assignment, case study, presentation, business plan, community-based project, research experiment, artistic project, interview and oral history, design project, or other, related to a climate change topic.

Applicants are encouraged to contact the Office of Undergraduate Education before submitting proposals to discuss how the criteria are addressed. Please note that it is not uncommon for proposals to be returned with comments, and that approval sometimes requires resubmission to ensure the course meets each specific goal of the JTCCE requirement.

### PROCEDURE FOR SUBMISSION OF COURSES

Prior to following the instructions below, submitters should meet with their Department Chair (or equivalent) to ensure they are aware of and approve the proposed course for use as a Jane Teranes Climate Change Education Requirement course. Departments are responsible for ensuring approved courses maintain alignment with the Requirement's criteria for the duration of the JTCCER designation.

Please provide the following *three* items through the JTCCER Response Form:

1. The [JTCCER Response form](#)

2. An annotated syllabus with course description, lecture titles (or other thematic organization)
3. Approved or pending eCourse form

For new courses and reactivated course numbers, the Department must also submit the course approval form in eCourse to the Undergraduate Council, who will work with the JTCCE Requirement Committee to approve submitted courses.
